One of the first things I wish to talk about is the release of my latest typeface, which I have called Aspect. It is a sans serif design, which I am quite excited about as it uses new technology; it also looks well when set normally, but really comes to life when in the hands of the creative typographer with the use of the many optional ligatures and swashes.

My latest design is called Aspect; I hope that you will find it visually interesting and that little bit different when used with all the ligature and swash variations. It is a digitised face that includes all the latest technology to give you full cross platform compatibility.

The new typeface joins the growing list of award winning designs that I have developed over the past nine years; it is a sans serif, vertical script design, with a constant line weight.

Aspect has been designed using OpenType technology, allowing the same font to be used across existing systems, from Mac OS 8.6 and Windows 95 to their very latest versions.



OpenType not only enables Aspect to be fully cross platform compatible, but also allows a wide range of extra characters to be used in each font. There are in fact over two hundred additional characters, including many ligatures and special forms across each font weight, adding up to a superb typeface offering a wide range of creativity when in use.

Designers, who are not currently using applications that support OpenType features, can use my built-in features that give the new typeface the ability to make full use of its potential through the additional Aspect X fonts.
